

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Assessment 4: Final Examination. This will be held in the final examination period and will be 2 hours in duration. The examination will include multiple choice questions on the History & Systems, Ethics, and CV Writing, and UN SDGs. It will also include some short-answer text-based questions based on the lecture content from Weeks (1-7).

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The aim of this assessment is to assess your knowledge of the core readings. Online quizzes for 10 of the core readings have been set up on Moodle and will be available to complete throughout the term. You will receive 1% for completion of each quiz. All ten quizzes need to be completed by the end of Week 10, and feedback will be provided through Moodle.

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Assessment 2: Part A: Group Presentation (15 mins, 15%, wk 5) and Individual Written Project Proposal (1500 words, 30%, wk 8). The aim of this assessment is to: (1) familiarise you with the process of designing research in applied settings, (2) familiarise you with a particular reporting style, and help you acquire the basics of effective and efficient scientific communication, (3) emphasise the development of your information literacy skills, as well as promoting critical thinking, and (4) provide you with a supported collaborative learning experience. Throughout the first part of the semester your will collaborate as a group to design an intervention to address a specific psychological issue that is tied to one or more UN Sustainable Development Goals. You will propose to test your hypothesis by investigating the needs of the target population, developing an intervention, and a means for evaluating the effectiveness of the intervention. Each group will present their research proposal to the class in Week 5. Normally, all group members will receive the same mark. Peer evaluation of your group members' contributions will be used to moderate individual marks for this assignment.

Part B: After giving your group presentation, and based on any suggestions or feedback you have received on it, you will prepare an individual write-up of your project which is due by the end of Week 8. Marks and feedback will be returned within 10 working days of the due date.

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The portfolio is due in Week 10. Marks and feedback will be released within 10 working days.
